5	MR. MEATH: Ladies and gentlemen, please
6	come in and take your seats.
7	I realized when I was walking up here
8	that I am going have to stand sideways, lest I
9	chose a podium to stand behind, so pardon me,
10	if it gets a little awkward.
11	Good morning to everybody. My name is
12	Jim Meath, and I am the president of the
13	Virginia Bar Association. And I want to
14	welcome everybody to the 115th summer meeting
15	of this association.
16	We are very, very pleased to present what
17	has now become the traditional opening debate
18	for the gubernatorial election.
19	I want to extend to each and every one of
20	you our invitation to attend a reception which
21	follows this event. It will be held in the
22	Chesapeake Room, which is down the hall to my
23	right. This will afford everyone an
24	opportunity to meet the candidates as well as
25	our moderator and our distinguished panelists.

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1	I want to take time now to do something
2	which, unfortunately, I failed to do at the
3	proceedings last night.
4	None of this would be possible were it
5	not for the tremendous dedication and work of
6	the staff of the Virginia Bar Association.
7	I will tell you, ladies and gentlemen,
8	these people spent countless hours setting up
9	the arrangements for this meeting and the
10	meeting itself is enough work, but to put on
11	the debate and all of the things that go along
12	with that has really been incredible and they
13	have done a tremendous job, and I would like to
14	publicly recognize them and have you all help
15	me do that.
16	(Applause.)
17	MR. MEATH: This morning's debate will be
18	moderated by Professor Robert Holsworth. Bob
19	Holsworth is a Professor of Political Science
20	and Public Administration, and he is the
21	director of the Center for Public Policy of
22	Virginia Commonwealth University.
23	He is a regular political analyst for
24	WTVR-TV. He received his PhD from the
25	University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

1	He teaches courses in Virginia politics,
2	American politics and political theory. He is
3	extensively published. He comments regularly
4	on Virginia politics and his observations and
5	his comments have appeared in the Wall Street
6	Journal, and the New York Times, the Washington
7	Post, Time Magazine, and the U.S News and World
8	Report and others.
9	In 1997, Bob received the State Counsel
10	of Higher Education Outstanding Faculty award.
11	We are very, very pleased, and I will ask
12	you to help me welcome Bob Holsworth.
13	(Applause.)
14	MR. HOLSWORTH: Good morning, and welcome
15	everyone.
16	Let me begin by introducing our panel.
17	First we have Jennifer Wishon, who is the
18	Richmond Bureau Chief for WDBJ-TV in Roanoke.
19	And this is Jennifer's first gubernatorial
20	election.
21	The second panelist is cub reporter Tyler
22	Whitley, from the Richmond Times-Dispatch.
23	This is Tyler's eighth gubernatorial election.
24	And our third panelist is May-Lily Lee,
25	who is host and senior producer of Virginia

1	Currents on the Comunity Idea Stations, and
2	this is May-Lily's fifth gubernatorial
3	election.
4	Our timekeeper this morning is past
5	president of the BBA, Doug Rucker, and you will
6	all see his see him from the back and the
7	panelists the participants this morning will
8	be seeing yellow, green, and red signs,
9	depending upon where they are in their
10	discussions.
11	So right now, what I would like to do is
12	to introduce our two candidates for governor
13	who are participating this morning from the
14	Democratic and Republican parties of Virginia.
15	We are very fortunate this year to have
16	candidates who have significant statewide
17	experience.
18	So let me first introduce Lieutenant
19	Governor, Tim Kaine.
20	(Applause.)
21	MR. HOLSWORTH: Secondly, let me
22	introduce our former Attorney General,
23	Republican candidate for governor, Jerry
24	Kilgore.
25	(Applause.)

1	MR. HOLSWORTH: I would like to spend
2	just a minute going over the groundrules of the
3	debate today. We're going to begin with
4	two-minute opening statements by each
5	candidate, and then we are going to go to a
6	three-phase question period during the heart of
7	the debate.
8	The first phase will be questions put
9	forward by our panelists. We will have a
10	question, a response or a two-minute
11	response, a two-minute rebuttal, and a
12	one-minute surrebuttal. We will have six
13	questions asked that way.
14	Then the candidates will each question
15	each other. There will be two questions that
16	they will address to each other for a total of
17	four questions during that period.
18	Each candidate will have two minutes to
19	respond to the questions, and then there will
20	be a one-minute rebuttal.
21	And then, finally, I will have a set of
22	questions that have been drawn primarily and
23	culled from questions that members of the Bar
24	Association put into the kitty yesterday, and
25	that we went over and tried to combine and kind

1	of tweak for the last set of questions here.
2	Then finally there will be two-minute
3	closing statements by each candidate.
4	And all of this has taken place in terms
5	of coin tosses that have determined the various
6	orders of questioning, and the like.
7	So we're going to begin right away. But
8	before that, let me just make one other comment
9	here: The candidates have agreed to a set of
10	rules. They have agreed to no props. We ask
11	the audience to refrain from applause,
12	demonstration, and other visible shows of
13	support, disapproval, anxiety or concern.
14	And both Mr. Kaine and Mr. Kilgore I
15	will try to enforce rules as best I can to be
16	fair to both of you during the course of the
17	debate.
18	So let's begin with a two-minute opening
19	statement from Mr. Kaine.
20	MR. KAINE: Good morning to you-all. It
21	is good to be here with the VBA, with the
22	panel, with you, Jerry.
23	I hope this is the first of many
24	opportunities we will have to stand before
25	Virginians and share our visions for the

1	Commonwealth.
2	Virginia needs a strong leader to be its
3	governor a strong leader who can bring
4	Virginians together around the right priorities
5	to move this Commonwealth forward.
6	I have been that kind of strong leader
7	during my adult life values forged as a
8	missionary when I took a year off from law
9	school to work in Central America, values
10	forged as an active leader in my community in
11	church and civic affairs, values forged as a
12	practicing lawyer.
13	I know many of you, and I have had cases
14	with you as an award-winning lawyer and as the
15	managing director of my law firm.
16	And then I went into public life in 1994,
17	and led, in my community in a tough capacity,
18	as a city councilman and mayor of our capital
19	city, and now as Lieutenant Governor.
20	We have been proud to have a strong
21	leader in the last three-and-a-half years in
22	Governer Warner, and I have been a full partner
23	in moving this Commonwealth forward.
24	You remember where we were when this
25	debate last occurred, four years ago stalled

1	economies, bond rating about to be downgraded.
2	Budget the budget problems between the
3	legislature and the governor couldn't agree
4	on a budget.
5	Bitter partisanship on Capital Square
6	that made the simple things hard, and the hard
7	things nearly impossible.
8	Four years later here is where we are:
9	Second fastest job growth in the United States,
10	third lowest unemployment rate, restored AAA
11	bond rating, historic bipartisan investments in
12	education and other priorities.
13	I want to make sure as governor that we
14	keep moving Virginia forward. I'll use my
15	leadership experiences to help local
16	governments have resources and tools to target
17	property tax relief to homeowners. I'll tackle
18	the transportation challenges using the
19	experiences I gained as a mayor in a city that
20	had huge transportation needs.
21	I'll fight for an education system that
22	is world class in a world economy, and I'll
23	keep our economy moving forward.
24	Virginia needs to go forward not
25	backwards.

2	MR. HOLSWORTH: Two minutes for Mr.
3	Kilgore.
4	MR. KILGORE: Good morning. I want to
5	thank the Virginia Bar Association for hosting
6	this third debate between my opponent and me.
7	Today I ask for the privilege to serve as
8	your governor to serve as your governor to
9	bring a Commonwealth of opportunity through
10	honest reform.
11	Honest with reforming our education
12	system so that we do have better pay for better
13	teachers, so that our children do get a better
14	education, bringing more dollars to the
15	transportation system, but trusting the people
16	in the region to set their own regional
17	priority needs, creating jobs and opportunity,
18	by keeping our taxes low and our regulatory
19	regulations even lower, to make Virginia the
20	place businesses want to locate and expand.
21	I am glad to be on stage with my
22	opponents today. And, yes, I said "my
23	opponents," because, just like you, I am
24	anxious to see which Tim Kaine has shown up
25	today the Tim Kaine that says he is a

23	MR. HOLSWORTH: Our first question is
24	from Jennifer Wishon to Mr. Kilgore.
25	MS. WISHON: Mr. Kilgore, there is

1	national debate about whether or not
2	creationism or intelligent design should be
3	taught alongside the evolution theory in public
4	schools.
5	Do you think intelligent design should
6	become part of Virginia's curriculum?
7	MR. KILGORE: I support Virginia's
8	standards of learning. And in Virginia's
9	standards of learning, we focus on the science,
10	and I continue to support the standards of
11	learning, because the standards were created
12	during Governor Allen's tenure as governor.
13	And those standards have brought great quality
14	to Virginia's public education system.
15	I will plan to improve education in our
16	Commonwealth. My "better pay for better
17	teachers" plan will bring performance pay into
18	the public education system.
19	I believe that if we reward those impact
20	teachers in our school systems, we will deliver
21	a better education system for our children.
22	I am committed to giving parents tax
23	credits up to \$500 per child to empower
24	them to purchase tutoring or other educational
25	supplies. I want Virginians to have a world

1	class education.
2	And that stands in stark difference with
3	my opponent. When he was in charge of the
4	Richmond Public School System, he oversaw the
5	second-worst performing school system in the
6	entire Commonwealth. That is not what Virginia
7	needs.
8	When he served as mayor of the City of
9	Richmond, we saw budget overruns. We have yet
10	to see an education plan that will make a
11	difference in the lives of all of our children
12	and our parents.
13	He equates spending more money with
14	raising the standards.
15	That is not the way it works. And it is
16	certainly not the way it worked in the City of
17	Richmond more money per student than almost
18	any locality in the entire state, yet they had
19	the second lowest performing school district in
20	the entire state.
21	I will move Virginia forward. I will
22	move Virginia forward, because I believe better
23	pay for better teachers.
24	MR. HOLSWORTH: Two minutes for Mr.
25	Kaine.

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MR. KAINE: Jerry, I am glad to hear you say you support public education because your record as Attorney General, and as a public servant has been consistently to fight against public education at every turn.

When we fought for budget reform in 2004, at the very heart of budget reform was two needs: the need to save the state's bond rate, which you opposed, and the need to invest and catch up with unmet obligations in our public schools.

By the end of the Gilmore administration, the state was down nearly a billion dollars a year in funding the public schools of the Commonwealth. That is nearly \$800 per child.

And I'm selfish about this one, Jerry, because I have got two kids, who are here with me, who are in the public schools -- who are in the public schools of Richmond.

I saw as you fought against budget reform for school funding. Thank God, budget reform ended up passing with your twin brother's support, because the Scott County schools that educated you received 5 million dollars more in state funding because your point of view was

1	not listened to.
2	You have said you wanted to roll back
3	budget reform, which would hurt education
4	funding. You have said you want to repeal the
5	state lottery, which would pull 400 million
6	dollars a year out of education funding.
7	And you have even said, directly with me,
8	in a place like this a couple of years ago,
9	that fully phasing out the car tax is a more
10	important priority for Virginia's future than
11	fully funding the educational needs of
12	Virginia's kids.
13	I know this: In a world economy where we
14	are not competing against North Carolina and
15	Maryland, but we are now competing against
16	Maryland against India, against China,
17	against nations all over the world, we can't
18	afford to put the educational leadership of
19	this Commonwealth in the hands of one of the
20	most persistent foes of education funding there
21	is.
22	I believe not just in funding, but in
23	accountability. That's why I visited schools
24	in 118 of the 134 school districts of Virginia.
25	That is why I have promoted comprehensive

1	evaluations of teachers something that is
2	lacking now.
3	You have to be honest about the funding.
4	You have to be honest about accountability.
5	That is the way to take us forward.
6	MR. HOLSWORTH: One minute for Mr.
7	Kilgore.
8	MR. KILGORE: Let me be clear: Raising
9	taxes does not equal leadership. I worked with
10	Governor George Allen. I watched as Governor
11	Gilmore both governors raised, and increased
12	funding for K through 12 education without
13	raising taxes. In fact, they put more money
14	into K through 12 education than this
15	administration has. More dollars went in
16	without raising taxes. That is the type of
17	leader I am going to be. That is the type of
18	governor I am going to be. I am going to make
19	public education a priority in our state
20	budget. I'm going to bring a "better pay for
21	better teachers" plan so that our children do
22	get a better education.
23	I am just not going to grade our
24	teachers. I am going to reward our teachers
25	with bonuses, and improve the quality of

1	education for Virginia.
2	I don't think we want someone serving as
3	governor who oversaw the second-worst
4	performing school district in the entire
5	Commonwealth.
6	MR. HOLSWORTH: A question from Tyler
7	Whitley to Mr. Kaine.
8	MR. WHITLEY: Mr. Kaine, let's get on the
9	subject of transportation here.
10	You say you would veto a tax increase for
11	transportation, unless you were sure the
12	Transportation Trust Fund is not violated.
13	If the General Assembly sends you a plan
14	with a tax increase that does not raid the
15	trust fund, would you sign it?
16	MR. KAINE: I will veto any tax increase
17	that is sent to me from the General Assembly
18	unless the Transportation Trust Fund is locked
19	up. I will veto any such increase.
20	And the General Assembly has not proposed
21	and has not shown me any indication that they
22	are yet willing to lock up the Transportation
23	Trust Fund.
24	Let me explain why this is so important.
25	When I was the mayor of Richmond, I had

	Page 20
1	this as part of my supervision. I had city
2	roads; I had regional roads. I had a port
3	system. I had airport authority.
4	We restored rail service to downtown
5	Richmond. We had the port of Richmond and
6	other transportation venues. I know how to
7	have transportation work together to succeed.
8	But we have a Transportation Trust Fund
9	in Virginia. And the legislature has put trust
10	into that fund for a reason. We are guaranteed
11	that when money is paid at the gas tank, when
12	we pay our seventeen-and-a-half cents a gallon,
13	or the other transportation revenues, that
14	those monies will only be used for
15	transportation.
16	I was outraged when I was elected as
17	Lieutenant Governor and found that through
18	backdoor language in the budget bill, the
19	legislature could pull money out of the
20	Transportation Trust Fund and use it for other
21	priorities. And that has happened. That has
22	happened over the last decade.
23	And so I have been on a mission starting
24	a few years ago and it has been lonely at
25	times but the mission has been to lock up

Page 21 1 the Transportation Trust Fund, and to make sure that the legislature will never pull money out 3 to use for non-transportation purposes. 4 And so I have said, with respect to 5 transportation: We need to do some things. We 6 need to be urgent in expressing interest in the challenge of this problem. We need to make 7 sure we plan land use and transportation 8 better. 9 10 There's no way to tax and pave our way 11 out of the transportation problems that we now have. We need to recognize the multiple modes 12 13 of transportation. But as far as financing goes: Unless and 14 15 until the Transportation Trust Fund is locked 16 up, I will not entertain requests for new 17 revenue. I will use surplus funds as we did last 18 19 year to draw down more federal dollars and 20 expand transportation investments. 2.1 earmark the auto insurance premiums that you 2.2 pay, that the legislature has earmarked for transportation, and make sure those funds are 23 24 used as advertised. 25 MR. HOLSWORTH: Two minutes for Mr.

	Kilgore.
2	MR. KILGORE: Let me be clear.
3	I will veto any budget the General
4	Assembly sends to me that raids the
5	Commonwealth Transportation Trust Fund.
6	Likewise, I will veto any legislation
7	sent to me by the General Assembly that
8	attempts to raise taxes without asking the
9	people first.
10	I trust the people. I always have. I
11	always will. I trust the people in the regions
12	of this Commonwealth to work with us to set
13	their own regional priority needs.
14	I have a transportation plan that will
15	work, will bring more dollars into the
16	transportation system by using general fund
17	dollars those dollars that come from your
18	income and sales tax.
19	We have seen 2.2 billion dollars in new
20	growth. I would rather build roads and
21	bridges, fund my "better pay for better
22	teachers" plan. Let's see something for that
23	revenue, rather than create new programs.
24	I'll make sure that we are innovative in
25	the area of transportation. And I'll make sure

1	that people are involved in making these
2	decisions.
3	My opponent's plan is a wait-and-see
4	plan. He is going to wait and see if the
5	General Assembly and the voters lock up the
6	Commonwealth's Transportation Trust Fund.
7	I have told you what I'll do. I'll veto
8	legislation that comes to me that raids that
9	Commonwealth Transportation Trust Fund.
10	His plan can be summed up with one
11	phrase: Stuck in traffic, get used to it.
12	There is going to be no dollars coming
13	into transportation under his plan.
14	My plan is a plan that works, because my
15	plan involves the people, my plan involves the
16	regions. We are going to get transportation
17	moving again in Virginia.
18	MR. HOLSWORTH: One minute for Mr. Kaine.
19	MR. KAINE: Jerry, I am glad to hear that
20	you now support transportation and your
21	transportation plan has two elements to it.
22	First, you say that you would like to let
23	regions have regional referenda to raise their
24	own taxes for transportation.
25	But as you and others in this room

1	remember, the regions did just that in 2002.
2	And you opposed the referendum.
3	I have heard of voting for something
4	before you vote against it, but I've never
5	heard of proposing as the centerpiece of your
6	transportation plan, something that you oppose.
7	And you have continued to say even recently
8	that you will oppose the regional referenda for
9	transportation that you are making the
10	centerpiece of your transportation plan.
11	The second thing you talk about is
12	vetoing any increase in any revenues unless
13	there is a referendum requirement.
14	I don't know why you would want to trade
15	out a budgetary system that was designed by
16	Jefferson and Madison and trade it for a
17	California system of referendum government
18	by referendum that has failed miserably.
19	If you like California, visit California.
20	But don't turn Virginia into California.
21	MR. HOLSWORTH: Question by May-Lily Lee
22	for Mr. Kilgore.
23	MS. LEE: Mr. Kilgore, you have said on
24	many issues that you may be in more agreement
25	with Democrat Mark Warner than Mr. Kaine is.

1	What are some of those issues?
2	And, if elected, how would Governor
3	Kilgore be similar to or different from
4	Governor Warner?
5	MR. KILGORE: Thank you for your
6	question.
7	I have worked with Governor Warner over
8	the last three years on issues that we could
9	agree upon. And we have agreed upon many
10	issues that affect the Commonwealth from
11	making sure that we go out and champion the
12	Higher Education Bond Referendum that will
13	bring more buildings, more structures to our
14	colleges and universities as well as our
15	museums around the Commonwealth to work with
16	him on battling gangs in Virginia.
17	I appeared at a press conference with him
18	to recognize the growing problem of gangsto
19	not only champion the increased penalties, but
20	to champion community involvementgetting the
21	federal, state and local authorities to work
22	together.
23	Working with his administration on our
24	innovative Meth-Watch program that controls
25	methamphetamine, and its use a program that

1	was lauded by the Virginia State Police
2	Superintendent just months ago.
3	We have worked with the governor on some
4	very important issues. I disagreed with him
5	from time to time, but we have worked with him.
6	Now, my opponent has a history of having
7	the governor disagree with him. Appearing at a
8	joint press conference in 2001, the Governor
9	felt obliged to distance himself from my
10	opponent on the issues of my opponent's
11	opposition to Second Amendment rights, his
12	opposition to the death penalty he even
13	called for a moratorium and his support of
14	civil unions.
15	Mark Warner felt the need to distance
16	himself from my opponent then.
17	I worked to move Virginia forward. I'll
18	continue to work in a bipartisan method to move
19	our Commonwealth forward, agree on issues on
20	which we can agree upon, and disagree when we
21	cannot.
22	MR. HOLSWORTH: Two minutes for Mr.
23	Kaine.
24	MR. KAINE: Jerry, you really need to be
25	straight with Virginia voters when you stand

1	here and say that you worked with Governor
2	Warner. Because there has been no more
3	persistent and vigorous opponent and even
4	sort of extreme in your language in the way you
5	characterize Governor Warner than you.
6	I remember a letter that you sent out to
7	thousands of people that you signed, saying
8	Governor Warner was a liar, and attacking
9	Governor Warner in a whole series of different
10	ways.
11	And so now here at the end, when you see
12	this administration has gotten Virginia moving
13	forward we have the second-fastest job
14	growth in America, and a AAA bond rating you
15	have opposed all of those things. Suddenly you
16	say you have worked closely with Governor
17	Warner. Well, the facts would tell otherwise.
18	The key event of the Warner
19	Administration was the budget reform in 2004.
20	That was a bipartisan budget reform.
21	We were faced with losing our AAA bond
22	rating. We had unmet obligations to our public
23	schools that were nearly a billion dollars a
24	year. And the legislature, in a bipartisan
25	way Democrats and Republicans alike came

1	together to solve Virginia's budget problems
2	under the leadership of Governor Warner.
3	Jerry, where were you in 2004? Where
4	were you when Governor Warner stood up to do
5	the right thing with many of us in this room.
6	You first said that there was no budget
7	problem. You next said that if there was a
8	budget problem, maybe we should borrow a lot of
9	money to fill the hole.
10	You encouraged legislators to back away
11	from the table of bipartisan compromise and
12	throw the budget out to a public referendum for
13	the first time since Jamestown.
14	You then encouraged legislators not to
15	support the ultimate budget deal, and you
16	couldn't even convince your identical twin
17	brother, who serves in the legislature, and
18	voted for the bipartisan budget.
19	Since the budget deal that is the
20	centerpiece of the Warner Administration, you
21	said you want to roll it back when you're
22	governor.
23	You have stood against us in all of the
24	reforms that we have made to turn Virginia
25	around and be fiscally responsible, to be

1	pro-business, and to move this state forward.
2	And I cannot believe that you would stand
3	here now and claim that you are Mark Warner's
4	friend and supporter.
5	MR. HOLSWORTH: One minute for Mr.
6	Kilgore.
7	MR. KILGORE: I have to wonder if he even
8	believes, sometimes, what he says.
9	I have worked with the Governor. He
10	knows that to be the case. I have worked with
11	him on very important issues in a bipartisan
12	manner that does move Virginia forward.
13	I didn't support the largest tax increase
14	in Virginia history. And I am proud for not
15	supporting that tax increase, because I wanted
16	to trust the people. I have been proven right
17	that the tax increase wasn't necessary. I
18	think we need to trust the people before we ask
19	them to pay the bill.
20	On the gang issue that I worked with
21	Governor Warner on, you went AWOL Absent
22	Without Leadership.
23	You haven't stepped up to the plate and
24	offered any solutions. We have offered
25	solutions. We have increased penalties. We

2	programs for our children. We have even
3	proposed expanding the death penalty, so that
4	those gang leaders that order gang members to
5	commit murder will be subjected to the same
6	penalties as the trigger man.
7	That is our leadership. That is how we
8	work together.
9	MR. HOLSWORTH: Our next question is by
10	Jennifer Wishon, for Mr. Kaine.
11	MS. WISHON: Mr. Kaine, you say that you
12	are personally against the death penalty and
13	abortion, but that your beliefs would not
14	affect your policy decisions and that you would
15	uphold Virginia law.
16	In thinking about leadership, how can
17	Virginians determine when your beliefs will
18	count for them?
19	MR. KAINE: Thank you, Jennifer. It is a
20	very important question.
21	I had an experience when I was a young
22	man, and it was a transformative experience in
23	my life. When I was 21 years old, I decided to
24	take a year off of law school and go work with
25	missionaries in Honduras.

Page 31 1 And I worked with a guy by the name of 2 Jim O'Leary, who became my life hero. He gave 3 40 years of his life to serving the poorest of 4 the poor. He taught me about faith and about faith in action. And that made a public 5 6 servant out of me. 7 I came back from Honduras, having worked with poor kids with a renewed respect for the 8 sanctity of life. And not because my church 9 teaches it -- but because I have come to 10 11 believe the teachings of my church through my adult life, I believe life is sacred. 12 And I haven't hesitated to state 13 consistently over the years that I am against 14 15 abortion and the death penalty. 16 And I have stated since I first got into 17 public life: I am not going to change my religious view to get elected to public office. 18 19 And I won't let anybody push me around 20 for my religious views or question them. 2.1 But beginning in 1994, I have taken on 2.2 the role of public servant. And I have had to 23 put my hand on a Bible, affirming everything I 24 believe, and raise my right hand and swear that 25 I will uphold the laws of the Commonwealth and

Page 32 1 of the United States. 2 And I view that oath like my wedding 3 I view it as an oath that I am not going 4 to break, and I wouldn't take it unless I could 5 carry it out. 6 So I am not shy about saying what my 7 positions are. I am a crime fighter who has come up with programs like Project Exile, and a 8 whole series of things to cut crime. 9 10 I believe there are very common-sensible 11 thing that we can do to reduce abortion. 12 example, enforce the restrictions we have, pass 13 a ban on partial-birth abortion, insure that women having access to health care, including 14 15 contraception. 16 I don't believe we should criminalize 17 women's health care choices. But I believe that you can do things that are consistent with 18 19 my views. But at the end of the day, I'm going 20 to carry out my oath of office. 12	public college and university.
13	It is the number one complaint I hear
14	when I am traveling in northern Virginia or
15	Hampton Roads, when a parent comes up to me and
16	says: My good student cannot get admitted into
17	a Virginia college or university.
18	I want to work with programs like Access
19	UVA to reach out to all Virginians and make
20	education the opportunity available to students
21	that otherwise couldn't afford educational
22	opportunities.
23	My opponent admitted after he was mayor
24	that he had witnessed the Richmond Public
25	School System become segregated again.

1	840 murders occurred while he was serving
2	on counsel and as mayor mostly African-
3	Americans.
4	I want to bring a safe Virginia, a
5	productive Virginia for all.
6	MR. HOLSWORTH: Mr. Kaine, President Bush
7	is now in the process of appointing a new
8	Supreme Court Justice, and there is much
9	speculation that there may be more to come.
10	This could eventually have an impact on
11	state politics here in Virginia.
12	If the new Supreme Court allowed more
13	restrictions to be put on Roe V. Wade, and the
14	legislature presented you with bills that could
15	further restrict Roe V. Wade, would you be
16	willing to sign them?
17	MR. KAINE: Let me first just add a point
18	to what Jerry said, and then Bob, I am going to
19	answer your question.
20	When he came back on diversity, he said
21	he supports diversity, but he wants to make
22	sure that quote: Good, qualified students
23	could get in to the state's colleges and
24	universities.
25	I don't believe that the state's

1	diversity programs are accepting unqualified
2	students. You can have diversity and have
3	qualified students there. So I would just
4	point that out.
5	That's a common myth of diversity
6	programs, that it keeps qualified students out
7	by letting unqualified students in. And I do

10	With respect to the Supreme Court
11	question, Bob, there are some hypotheticals,
12	but it deals ultimately with the question of
13	abortion and abortion rights.

17	And I think that there is a common ground
18	in this area because Virginians want to reduce
19	abortions. I have not met a single person in
20	Virginia who wants to increase abortion. Every
21	one I know wants to reduce abortion.
22	I think there are tried and tested ways
23	to reduce abortion.
24	First, enforce the current restrictions
25	that we have, the restrictions that demonstrate

2	something minor; that it is a serious moral
3	issue.
4	Second, pass an enforceable partial-birth
5	ban in Virginia. I have long supported a ban

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1	We have common ground and we can work
2	together to achieve the goal.
3	MR. HOLSWORTH: Two minutes for Mr.
4	Kilgore.
5	MR. KILGORE: Thank you. I support a
6	culture of life. I always have. I always
7	will.
8	I supported reasonable safeguards in this
9	arena, including getting parents involved in
10	one of the most critical health care decisions
11	a teenage daughter can make. Getting parents
12	involved by working to make sure parental
13	notification and parental consent became the
14	law of the Commonwealth. Working to rid
15	Virginia of this barbaric practice we call
16	"partial-birth abortion."
17	Agreeing with the American Medical
18	Association that there is no medically
19	necessary reason to take the life of a child
20	just moments before it takes its first breath.
21	I am fighting for that legislation,
22	absolutely, because I agree with the American
23	Medical Association.
24	My opponent can't be trusted on this
25	important issue. He claimed in 2001 that he

1	was pro-choice, yet he is running ads in
2	Western Virginia claiming to be pro-life.
3	In 2001, he opposed parental consent, yet
4	in 2005 he says he favors parental consent.
5	When appearing before the Family
6	Foundation this past January before their Board

8	question: You say tonight you are pro-life,
9	but back then you said you were pro-choice.
10	His response: I would have said that
11	then.
12	He can't be trusted on this very
13	important decision. I support reasonable

17	MR. KAINE: Jerry, you should answer the
18	question.
19	You were asked what restrictions that you
20	would support. You said that abortion should
21	be criminalized in Virginia except in the
22	interest of life of the mother, rape, or
23	incest.
24	You said that you would only allow an
25	abortion in the instance of rape or incest if
